# A MESSAGE FROM THE Mayor

It is with a heavy heart that I offer our deepest sympathies toward the victims and their families of the Surfside condominium collapse.



This was a tragedy we never saw coming and one you pray to never see in your lifetime. Events like this cause us to take stock of what is important in our lives and, as a municipality, make us pause and review our procedures to see how we can ensure a devastation like this never occurs in our city.

In response to the collapse, our Building Department, under the leadership of Building Official Clay Parker, initiated a proactive inspection process for commercial and multi-family buildings built prior to 1982. For those who don't know, Miami-Dade County Code requires condominium buildings to be recertified when they become 40 years old, and then every 10 years after. Sunny Isles Beach has 59 properties that were built before 1982, and of these properties, 39 have already received their required recertification for continued occupancy. Twenty properties are currently in different stages of compliance toward their recertification.

As of June 28, 2021, our Building Department began conducting visual inspections to assess the condition of all 59 buildings built prior to 1982 and look for unusual structural and/or electrical deficiencies in the structures. The department is also reviewing past inspection paperwork for each property.

The goal of our proactive measures is to gain a better understanding of the current condition of the buildings that are 40 years or older, and how we can mitigate any potential concerns. Once the inspection is complete, the Building Department will issue notices to the property owner of any defects and require proper action, including further evaluation by a Florida licensed professional engineer.

With approximately 97% of our residents living in one of more than 100 condominiums in Sunny Isles Beach, our top priority is ensuring your safety. I also want to point out that the majority of condominium buildings in our city are under the age of concern for re-inspection. We are proceeding swiftly and with the utmost caution to assure our residents of their safety and the safety of their homes. My thoughts and prayers are with the residents of Champlain Towers and their families as they navigate the aftermath of this devastating tragedy.

### Message from the City Manager

For those who may not know, our Police Chief, Dwight Snyder, is retiring next month. Though we will miss him, Chief Snyder has had an extraordinary 46-year career, half of which was spent building and leading our police department.

A known quantity in the policing community, Dwight was among the first group of officers to join the Sunny Isles Beach Police Department. He was just finishing up 23 years of service with the Hialeah Police Department when he was invited to join and help build the new Sunny Isles Beach Police Department as it was establishing in 1998. He first started out as a patrolman, and 23 years and five promotions later, he is retiring as the City's third Chief of Police.

When Dwight first began working for the police department, Sunny Isles Beach was a completely different city. The east side of Collins Avenue was known for the



run-down along the beach, and street crimes and drugs were among the top concerns the police department. Now, the City is cleaned crime rates have remained low, and PD is able to develop meaningful and productive relationships with the community.

Dwight's tenure as Chief began in 2018 after former Chief

Fred Maas retired. During the transition of chiefs in July 2018, Dwight's first defining moment was when a family was hit by a car on a Collins Avenue sidewalk. The next year we had the drive by shooting on Collins Avenue, and earlier this year was the tragedy on Sunny Isles Boulevard. Not to mention, he has spent the past 15 months navigating police work and keeping the community safe during the COVID-19 pandemic. Chief Snyder was thrown into some of the most unprecedented and challenging incidents in just a short time span, and I want to commend his leadership when presiding over these devastating and delicate issues. He has also been a leader to his department of more than 50 officers

who have faced their own hardships and tragedies throughout the last three years.

Though his time as Chief was sometimes tumultuous and challenging, Chief Snyder has accomplished great



things in Sunny Isles Beach and has helped guide our police department into a new era of policing. Under his leadership, we continued our philosophy of community policing as the cornerstone of the department, expanded our zero-tolerance traffic enforcement, and made great strides in improving traffic and pedestrian safety. Additionally, Chief Snyder helped to enhance safety at the school, and during the school year, you could often see him directing traffic in the mornings at the school.

In 2011, Dwight received the great honor of attending the FBI National Academy due to his extraordinary leadership and police career. During this 10-week program, he diversified and enhanced his skill set bringing back unparalleled knowledge to our police department. Additionally, Dwight served as the Vice President of the Police Officers Assistance Trust for many years where he helped to raise money and aid officers and their families in times of hardship and personal crisis. During his retirement, he plans to continue serving his community through volunteer work.

Over the next few months, we will be working with a professional recruiter in the search for a new police chief. As we undergo this leadership change, I want to acknowledge and commend Captain Michael Grandinetti and Captain Edward Santiago, who have been instrumental in ensuring a smooth and uninterrupted transition. Both captains have been with the Sunny Isles Beach Police Department for 23 years, joining the SIBPD on day one alongside Chief Snyder. Mike has been a captain for 16 years and Eddie was recently promoted in February 2020.

A history and aviation buff, Dwight was an outstanding police chief, compassionate friend, and respected role model. He has helped enhance our police department's policies and community presence, and we wish him all the best in his retirement. Chief Snyder's last day with the Sunny Isles Beach Police Department is August 30.

## **Repudiating and Confronting Hate**

Race hate isn't human nature; race hate is the abandonment of human nature. - Orson Welles

In the past couple of months we have witnessed a worrisome increase in hate crimes against Jewish communities in this country. Our area is home to a large and vibrant Jewish community and, unfortunately, Jewish residents of neighboring cities have been subjected to attacks and intimidation by ignorant and hateful individuals.

It is sad to see how humans can be so hateful and harmful to each other. The issue of antisemitism and hatred is ever present and of utmost concern to the City's elected officials, staff and police department. As a city we continue to take proactive and necessary measures to ensure the well-being and safety of our residents.

To further confront the issue of hate and antisemitism, the City Commission passed a resolution in January 2021 that condemns hate and extremism, and affirms the City's commitment to end the spread of hate and bigotry in all its forms. In February 2020 a resolution was passed that authorizes the City to join the Florida Hate Crime Coalition, which was established by the Anti-Defamation League to advocate for an expanded and comprehensive hate crime law in Florida. And at the end of 2020, the City Commission passed a resolution amended Chapter 195 existing Ordinance 2018-516 titled "Consideration of Anti-Semitism in Enforcing Laws."



The amendment included additional definitions of antisemitism that give our police department more robust and expanded language for enforcing criminal offenses based on antisemitism.

Our police department has also been very vigilant and diligent at keeping our residents safe. It has placed extra watches on all synagogues in Sunny Isles Beach, implemented intelligence sharing and periodic meetings with surrounding coastal cities, added additional officers on all shifts, established an open line of communication with our city rabbis, and provided off-duty officers to synagogues during large events and gatherings.
